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IITA's mobile app to track cassava seeds now in Tanzania

Timely access to quality seed is a major challenge in the production of cassava in Tanzania. A mobile application for real-time tracking of cassava seed production developed IITA for Nigeria is now available in Tanzania as part of efforts to address this challenge.

The application, known as the <u>Cassava SeedTracker</u>, provides real-time information on seed variety, quantity, and availability and facilitates timely access to seed markets. It enables producers to register their seed crops, regulatory authorities to do electronic certification of seeds, and those who need quality seed to locate seed suppliers and arrange for purchase.

Though SeedTracker is a web-based application that can be accessed on any internet-connected device, it can also be used offline.

The app was first developed by a team at IITA-Nigeria led by Lava Kumar, a Virologist and Head of the Germplasm Health Unit under the Building an Economically Sustainable, Integrated Seed System for Cassava in Nigeria (BASICS) project with the goal of applying 21st century ICT technology to improving the quality and efficiency of cassava seed production.

IITA is introducing the app in Tanzania in partnership with the Tanzania Official Seeds Certification Institute (TOSCI) and Mennonite Economic Development Associates (MEDA).

According to James Legg, IITA Plant Pathologist, SeedTracker will

support farmers to access quality certified planting material (seed) from producers and for producers, it will allow them to get markets for their produce. The app will also allow authorities to certify the seed.

"We are excited that the SeedTracker is now 'live' in Tanzania. However, IITA will continue to work with partners working for the development of cassava in the country to see that all of the app's 21st century promise is fully realized," he said

IITA has been working with TOSCI on developing quality standards for cassava seed in the country to ensure that seed produced is healthy and free of viruses. This is because farmers have been grappling with two viral diseases—cassava mosaic disease

and cassava brown streak disease—that have greatly reduced the crop's production in the country.

Researchers have identified several ways to halt the spread of the two diseases, including the development of high-yielding, disease-resistant varieties and setting up systems to multiply and distribute healthy seed.

One challenge, however, has been to ensure that seed is completely free of viruses as these are carried in cassava stems or cuttings. TOSCI is already active throughout the country inspecting cassava seed that is being produced for sale by farmers. Currently, however, this is a manual process which involves pen and paper. This is now set to change with the arrival of the Seed Tracker.

Forest Center of IITA celebrates "First-ever" Nigerian Bird Festival

On 6 and 7 December, the IITA
Forest Center celebrated the
first-ever Nigerian Bird Festival
with funding support from the
AG Leventis Foundation and US
Consulate General, Lagos. The event
convened students, ornithologists,
environmentalists, and nature lovers
on the IITA-lbadan campus, to
celebrate birds and highlight the need
to protect them and their habitats.
Over 70 representatives from different
organizations and institutions attended
the maiden event including the AP
Leventis Ornithological Research

Institute (APLORI), University of Jos, Nigerian Conservation Foundation, members of the Forest Center's School Conservation Clubs (SCCs), comprising the University of Ibadan, the Federal University of Technology Akure, Adejare International School, Ibadan; American Christian Academy, AUD High School, Ibadan, Olive Branches Group of School, Osogbo; Ilesha Grammar School, and Saint Anthony's High School, Ikoyi-Osun.

In his opening remarks, Adewale Awoyemi, Forest Center Manager,

welcomed participants to the event and spoke on the importance of birds. He said: "From indicating the status of the environment to environmental cleanliness and pest control, birds are such wonderful creatures that assist in stabilizing different ecosystems. Apart from the ecosystem services rendered by birds, they are also living organisms and have the right to life, which we must all respect". He further emphasized the need for a harmonious relationship between humans and nature.

Thereafter, participants were engaged in various activities aimed at elucidating the beauty of nature such as camping, bird-related poems, drama, and a bird identification competition. One highlight of the event was the exhibition displayed by the participating SCCs and other presenters. Their exhibition focused on four thematic areas: waste management, climate change and its impact on birds, the importance of birds in the ecosystems, and drawing, painting, costumes, and pictures of birds, all demonstrating the beauty and services provided by birds and why we need to conserve them.

Another highlight of the festival was the presentation of an "Award of Excellence in African Ornithology" to Professor Shiiwua Manu, who is the Director of **APLORI** and Technical Advisor to the Forest Center. The award was presented to him for his dedication to bird conservation by Hilde Koper-Limbourg (IITA Deputy Director General for Corporate Services) on behalf of IITA. Upon receiving the award, Prof Manu expressed his delight saying, "I am privileged to have been recognized by a reputable organization like IITA and will continue to promote the conservation of birds and other taxa". He commended

Forest Center staff for their dedication to duty and encouraged participants to contribute to the protection of biodiversity. All presenters at the event were also presented framed photographs of birds.

In her closing remarks, Koper-Limbourg, commended the Forest Center staff for their innovative ideas on biodiversity conservation and promised that IITA would continue to provide the institutional support to ensure the conservation of Nigeria's rich biodiversity. She thanked all participants and encouraged them to inculcate sustainable management of natural resources in their daily activities.
